Editorial

2020 will be remembered, for a number of reasons, as an extremely difficult year with travel and access restrictions placed on folks not just from the S. Gloucestershire recording area, but across the whole country.

Despite all of that, and concentrating on the positives, 2020 delivered some real surprises! Well over 200 species were logged including two new additions;

A spanking summer adult Collared Pratincole - *Glareola pratincola* (found by Aravind Ramesh) on May 21st on Pilning Wetland Reserve, Northwick Warth where it unselfishly lingered until the 25th giving ample opportunity for the large majority of folks to connect....

... and in December a winter flock of eleven (11) Tundra Bean Geese - Anser serrirostris (found by Pete Hazelwood) on the 5th at Oldbury Power Station and subsequently seen on and off in the area until the 12th.

Another unprecedented event, this time in April particularly, was an overland nocturnal migration of Common Scoter - *Melanitta nigra* where on the evenings of the 2nd and 3rd soundings coming from; Severn Beach, Yate, Marshfield, Oldland Common, Kingswood, Hanham, Alveston, Yate and Lyde Green as these birds flew over generally to the north-east. It's difficult to attribute any numbers to the passage but the movement was considered to have been not insignificant.

Breeding waders took on a whole new dimension in 2020 when Avocet - Recurvirostra avosetta bred for the first time on Pilning Wetland Reserve, Northwick Warth. An article by Paul Bowerman found on page 162 describes this miraculous event!

Not just Avocet - Recurvirostra avosetta, Little Ringed Plover - Charadrius dubius was also noted plus two other birds showed a strong interest as potential breeders, Oystercatcher - Haematopus ostralegus and Ringed Plover - Charadrius hiaticula were both seen sitting on nests in close proximity.

Sadly 2020 will be remembered mostly for the occurrence of the coronavirus (Covid19) in the UK restricting movement and access for the majority of birders.

However, the positive aspect was a clear and enthusiastic thrashing of local patches.

So in a new section this year there's a review of four major patches across S. Gloucestershire that are 'watched' on a regular basis; The Severnside area from just south of Severn Beach up to and including Aust Warth, Oldbury Power Station from just south of Oldbury Pill up as far as Shepperdine, Yate and Chipping Sodbury covering Stanshaw's Lake, Yate Common, Kingsgate Park, Brimsham Park and Chipping Sodbury Common and the Marshfield patch including the Shire Valley and 'hot spots' both above and below the A420.

Patch watching for some folks, and especially in 2020, can be hugely rewarding and it's thanks to those dedicated band of 'patch watchers' that folks can enjoy the benefits of their relentless day to day slogging. Strange as it seems, the appearance of even 'common' birds takes on an almost magical status when associated with a patch so a Treecreeper on the Warth demands full attention!

The Severnside patch delivered a number of great birds throughout the year including waders, petrels, egrets, warblers, buntings and geese/ducks/swans.

Oldbury Power Station produced nearly 150 species with some cracking rarities... but when a Corn Bunting shows up it triggers a major twitch... bizarre!

The Yate and Chipping Sodbury patch, especially the Common, is a delight for spring and autumn migrants. Chats, warblers, redstarts, flycatchers and on occasion some 'nice' surprises like Wood Warbler.

Marshfield... well if you want socially distanced birding this the place for you...? However it too can deliver, for example 2020 was the best ever year for numbers breaking the patch totals! 108 species five forms and three new additions, not too shabby!

The South Gloucestershire Bird Diary 2020 (Abridged)

All reports/ sightings of rare and scarce birds are subject to ratification by the appropriate rarities committee.

JANUARY

BLACK REDSTART

At Oldbury Power Station birds were noted throughout the month from the 1st until the 30th. And in Thornbury Town a male was noted on the roof of a house behind The Royal George on the 8th.

CETTI'S WARBLER

Two were seen at Oldbury Power Station on the 18th, one at Severn Beach on the 19th and one or two were logged at Littleton Bird Ringing Station throughout the month.

EGYPTIAN GOOSE

One was seen at Oldbury Power Station on the 5th.

FIRECREST

One reported from the Wild Places Project, Easter Compton on the 8th.

GOOSANDER

Birds were seen on Cooper's Lake, Yate; from the 9th- 18th and in Kingsgate Park. Yate on the 30th.

JACK SNIPE

One noted on Chipping Sodbury Common on the 1st, 12th and 20th and from Aust Warth from the 1st – 10th.

MARSH HARRIER

A winter female was seen at Oldbury Power Station on the 10th and one probably this species in flight down river from Aust Warth on the 19th.

MEDITERRANEAN GULL

Just one adult at Oldbury Power Station on the 22nd.

OYSTERCATCHER

One displaced individual over Chipping Sodbury Common on the 29th was a patch first!

RFD KITF

Two from the Oldbury Power Station environs during the month and one over Willsbridge Mill on the 26th.

SHORT-EARED OWL

One at Oldbury Power Station on the 27th.

TWITE

A wholly unconfirmed report of five on the 11th near the Second Sentry Box on Northwick Warth briefly before departing to the south-west.

WATER PIPIT

One on Northwick Warth on the 5th.

FEBRUARY

BLACK REDSTART

A male was noted on several dates early in the month at Oldbury Power Station.

COMMON CRANE

Two, of unknown origins, were seen in flight from the coast road and over Severn Beach on the 19th.

COMMON SCOTER

Two from Severn Beach on the 29th.

One at Kingsgate Park, Yate on the 2nd, six present briefly on the 19th and four present there on the 23rd. Four on Cooper's Lake. Yate on the 19th.

JACK SNIPE

One from Aust Warth on the 2nd, two from Chipping Sodbury Common on the 6th, 19th and 22nd with one there on the 26th.

MARSH HARRIER

An adult male at Oldbury Power Station on the 13th.

MEDITERRANEAN GULL

A sub-adult from New Passage on the 1st and one over Bradley Stoke on the 8th.

SHORT-EARED OWL

Five reports this month from four sites; Oldbury Power Station, Northwick Warth, Aust Warth and the Tormarton area.

MARCH

AVOCFT

Pilning Wetland Reserve, Northwick Warth; Five on the 19th, four on the 20th, ten on the 21st, eleven on the 22nd, seven on the 23rd and fifteen on the 25th.

BAR-TAILED GODWIT

The first of the year from Pilning Wetland Reserve, Northwick Warth on the 11th.

BLACK REDSTART

One or two present at Oldbury Power Station until at least the 16th.

COMMON CRANE

One heading north over Severn View Services, Aust on the 22nd and two south over Northwick Warth and Severn Beach on the 23rd.

COMMON WHITETHROAT

Two, the first of the year and earliest ever reported from S. Gloucestershire were noted on Redhill Lane between the Old Severn Bridge junction and Aust Road junction and on Hill Lane/ The Naite between Oldbury-on-Severn and Hill.

DARK-BELLIED BRENT GOOSE

Two, the first of the year, were noted at Aust on the 12th.

GOOSANDER

A female on the R. Avon east of the Lock Keeper at Keynsham on the 29th.

GOSHAWK

One, probably this species at Shepperdine on the 11th and one at Ashwicke on the 22nd.

HARRIER SPP.

One was seen quartering a hedgerow alongside the M5 between Falfield and Almondsbury on the 21st.

HOOPOE

One reported from Shepperdine Riding School late in the month.

JACK SNIPE

One displaced by high tides at Aust on the 11th.

LITTLE GULL

A winter adult, the first of the year, upriver past Oldbury Power Station on the 26th.

LITTLE RINGED PLOVER

Three, the first of the year, on the first sentry box pool, Pilning Wetland Reserve on the 14th.

MEDITERRANEAN GULL

A winter adult down river from Oldbury Power Station on the 6th.

NORTHERN WHEATEAR

A spring male, the first of the year, from Northwick Warth/ Pilning Wetland Reserve on the 5th.

RFD KITF

Thirty-five (35) bird days throughout the month from; Kingswood, Bristol, Marshfield, Northwick Warth, Abbywood, Filton, Kingsgate Park, Yate, Aust Warth, Chipping Sodbury, Little Badminton, Ashwicke, Severn Beach, Yate, Old Sodbury and Hanham.

RING-NECKED PARAKEET

One, the first of the year, from Three Brooks LNR, Bradley Stoke on the 25th.

SAND MARTIN

Around twenty-five, the first of the year, were reported from Pilning Wetlands Reserve on the 18th.

Scandinavian Rock Pipit

One, putatively this form, around Shaft Rocks, Severn Beach on the 12th, one at New Pill, Chittening Warth on the 13th and a summer individual at Oldbury Power station on the 21st.

SHORT-FARED OWL

Up to three noted throughout the month from Aust Warth, near Thornbury Sailing Club and Marshfield.

SPOONBILL

One at Pilning Wetland Reserve briefly on the 20th.

SWALLOW

One, the first of the year, over Lagoon I at Oldbury Power Station on the 20th.

WATER PIPIT

One near the second sentry box on Northwick Warth on the 14th and 19th.

WHITE WAGTAIL

One, the first of the year, from Down Road, Marshfield on the 26th.

WILLOW WARBLER

One, the first of the year, from Kingsgate Park, Yate on the 27th.

APRIL

ARCTIC SKUA


Movement in the estuary commenced on the 10th with a dark morph and continued with single birds until the 30th.

ARCTIC TERN

Several, the first of the year, at Oldbury Power Station on the 17th.

AVOCET

A nocturnal migrant was recorded over Severn Beach on the 4th and two were present on Pilning Wetland Reserve, Northwick Warth until at least the 9th.

BARNACLE GOOSE

Two past Oldbury Power Station on the 14th.

BLACK REDSTART

A female type was noted near The Jetty at Oldbury Power Station on the 10th and 25th.

CETTI'S WARBLER

Two at Lyde Green Lake on the 8th, two at Severn Beach on the 16th and two from Western Approaches, Severn Beach on the 28th.

COMMON REDSTART

An adult male on Chipping Sodbury Common was the first of the year on the 5th.

COMMON SCOTER

A previously unrecorded nocturnal movement of this species across the recording area from the 2nd with soundings from; Severn Beach, Yate, Marshfield, Oldland Common, Kingswood, Hanham, Alveston and Lyde Green.

COMMON SWIFT

The first arrivals were noted at Severn Beacon the 19th.

COMMON TERN

The first arrivals were noted at Oldbury Power Station on the 6th.

CUCKOO

The first this year was noted at Oldbury Power Station on the 11th.

EGYPTIAN GOOSE

Three, the highest count ever recorded in S. Glos, were present on Pilning WR, Northwick Warth on the 9th.

FULMAR

Two, the first of the year, were seen from Severn Beach on the 29th.

GARGANEY

A pair at Oldbury Power Station on the 16th with a male present on the 20th - 21st.

GOSHAWK

All sightings from Marshfield this month; One from Gunning's Wood, one over Beek's Lane and one over the village.

GRASSHOPPER WARBLER

Reeling birds from Oldbury Power Station on the 6th, Severn Beach and Longwell Green on the 16th with two at Severn Beach on the 19th.

Greenland Wheatear

The first of the year logged at Chipping Sodbury and Marshfield from the 10th.

GRFFNSHANK

The first of the year on Severnside on the 9th.

HAWFINCH

A male was noted around at Wickwar on the 8th.

HOBBY

This year's first at Marshfield on the 8th.

HOUSE MARTIN

This year's first arrivals were noted across the region on the 5th.

LESSER SPOTTED WOODPECKER

An unconfirmed report of one from The Hacket, Cleve Wood (ST: 65 89) near Thornbury on the 17th.

LESSER WHITETHROAT

This year's first arrivals were noted from the 9th. A record equalling earliest date!

MARSH HARRIER

A 'female' at Oldbury Power Station on the 23rd.

NIGHTINGALE

One was reported in full song on Yate Common at ST: 700 818 on the 16th.

OSPRFY

One, the first of the year, over Yate on the 4th and one over Severn Beach on the 10th.

PIED FLYCATCHER

A spring male, the first of the year, at New Passage on the 6th. This is the earliest ever recorded and spring female at Lower Woods, Wickwar on the 19th.

RED KITE

Forty-one (41) bird days this month with sightings from; Overscourt Woodland, Siston, Kingsgate Park, Yate, Coalpit Heath, Kingswood, Bristol, Alveston, Oldland Common, Yate, Severn Beach, Marshfield, Little/ Bradley Stoke, Wick, Pilning Wetland Reserve, Redwick, Shortwood landfill, Hanham, Warmley, West Littleton, Lyde Green, New Passage, Mangotsfield, Three Brooks LNR, and Chipping Sodbury.

RFFD WARBIFR

This year's first was noted at Oldbury Power Station on the 7th.

RING OU7FI

A spring male, the first of the year, was noted at Filton on the 5th.

SANDERLING

The first of the year was noted at Severn Beach on the 27th.

Six, the first of the year, from Oldbury Power Station on the 5th.

SEDGE WARBLER

This year's first from Oldbury Power Station on the 9th.

SHORT-EARED OWL

One at Oldbury Power Station on the 19th.

SPOONBILL

One on Pilning Wetland Reserve, Northwick Warth on the 3rd and 4th.

SPOTTED REDSHANK

The first of the year was noted over Pilning Wetland Reserve on the 19th.

TREE PIPIT

The first of the year over Severnside on the 9th.

WHIMBRFI

The first of the year was heard over Middledown Lane, Marshfield on the 4th.

WHINCHAT

The first of the year was found on Chipping Sodbury Common on the 16th.

A male singing on Yate Common on the 19th with a second bird there on the 21st and a singing male at Hanham on the 26th.

MAY

ARCTIC SKUA

At Severn Beach; Three on the 22nd, up to four on the 23rd and one on the 24th.

Three adults on Pilning Wetland Reserve on the 24th.

BLACK REDSTART

A female at New Passage on the 7th.

CETTI'S WARBLER

Two noted at Lyde Green Lake on the 2nd; Two from Severn Beach on the 4th and 9th; Eight from Western Distribution, Severn Beach on the 18th and two from Oldbury Power Station on the 21st.

COLLARED PRATINCOLE

A summer adult on Pining Wetland Reserve, Northwick Warth on May 21st - 25th.

One reported from the Rockhampton area on the 16th.

GANNFT

The first of the year noted from Severn Beach on the 23rd.

GUILLEMOT

The first of the year noted from Severn Beach on the 23rd.

HFN HARRIFR

A female reported near Hill on the 7th.

HOBBY

A small movement of birds across the recording area on the 4th involved at least seven individuals.

The first of the year was noted on Pilning Wetland Reserve on the 11th.

MARSH HARRIER

A female at Severn Beach on the 4th and a female-type at Oldbury Power Station on the 11th and 13th.

MEDITERRANEAN GULL

A 1st summer from Severn Beach on the 22nd and 23rd.

POMARINE SKUA

At least two from Severn Beach on the 22nd.

RAZORBILL

The first of the year from Severn Beach on the 23rd.

RED KITE

c. 85 bird days this month with sightings from; Hanham, Wapley Bushes LNR/ Yate, Chipping Sodbury, Yate, Frampton Cotterell, Wick, Warmley, Shire Valley, Marshfield, Kingsgate Park, Yate, Alveston, Stoke Gifford/ Bradley Stoke, Leyhill, West Littleton, Shepperdine, Thornbury, Iron Acton, Mangotsfield, Rockhampton, Wickwar, Littleton-upon-Severn, Codrington, Upton Cheyney, Coalpit Heath, Pilning Wetland Reserve, Frampton Cotterell, Old Sodbury, Tortworth, Little Stoke, Itchington and Latteridge.

WOOD SANDPIPER

A surprise patch first at Marshfield on the 11th; One on Pilning Wetland Reserve on the 14th.

JUNE

ARCTIC SKUA

From Severn Beach; A dark morph on the 28th; Three on the 29th.

AVOCFT

A French ringed adult on Pilning Wetland Reserve on the 15th; Up to fifteen present throughout the month plus at least three well grown chicks. Confirmation of the first ever breeding record of this species in S. Gloucestershire!

COMMON CROSSBILL

Two heard south over Thornbury on the 14th; Four north over Severn Beach on the 16th; Two north over Northwick Warth on the 17th; At least three over at Thornbury Sailing Club and one over Yate on the 26th.

GOSHAWK

One noted in the Marshfield area on the 28th.

GREAT WHITE EGRET

Four, the first of the year, from Severn Beach on the 16th; One on Pilning Wetland Reserve and two upriver past Oldbury Power Station on the 25th.

Five downriver past Oldbury Power Station, New Passage and Severn Beach; A 1st year male on the R. Severn off New Passage on the 19th.

LITTLE EGRET

A dozen were counted on Pilning Wetland Reserve on the 1st.

MANX SHEARWATER

Over 300 from Severn Beach on the 3rd.

MEDITERRANEAN GULL

One from Northwick Warth/ Pilning Wetland Reserve on the 1st, an adult on the 7th, a 2nd summer on the 8th and two adults on the 12th; An adult and 2nd calendar on Pilning Wetland Reserve on the 26th.

MISTLE THRUSH

At least forty (40) were counted west of Ringswell, Marshfield on the 13th, a new record count for S. Glos!

RED-BREASTED MERGANSER

A flock of twenty-two (22) 'redheads' in flight past Oldbury Power Station on the 30th.

RED KITE

Twelve with sightings from; Oldbury Power Station, Marshfield village, Northwick Warth, Coalpit Heath, Charfield, Shortwood, Chipping Sodbury Common and The Folly from the A420.

STORM PETREL

Two from Severn Beach on the 5th.

VELVET SCOTER

A female type from Severn Beach on the 5th.

WOOD SANDPIPER

An adult on Pilning Wetland Reserve on the 8th - 9th; The same or another adult there on the 13th - 19th.

YELLOW-LEGGED GULL

An adult and a juvenile on Pilning Wetland Reserve on the 30th.

AUGUST

AVOCFT

Two were seen in the New Passage/Pilning Wetland Reserve on the 9th.

BLACK TERN

One, the first of the year, north-east from Severn Beach on the 21st.

Blue-headed Wagtail

An autumn male, the first of the year, was noted from Northwick Warth on the 12th. Another was noted also on Northwick Warth on the 17th.

One over Chipping Sodbury Common early morning on the 8th.

CORMORANT

A good count of twenty-six (26) was logged at Oldbury Power Station on the 12th. Twenty-one counted in flight south past Northwick Warth on the 24th.

CURLEW SANDPIPER

A juvenile, the first of the year, was seen at Pillhead Gout, Oldbury-on-Severn on the 22nd - 23rd.

EUROPEAN NIGHTJAR

One in The Orchard at Oldbury Power Station on the 22nd.

GARGANEY

An unconfirmed report of four, a female and three juveniles, on The Lake at Oldbury Power Station on the 18th.

GOSHAWK

One reported frequenting the Tortworth area on several dates throughout the month.

GRASSHOPPER WARBIER

One was disturbed from a ditch on Chipping Sodbury Common on the 27th.

GREAT SKUA

One, the first of the year, was seen distantly from New Passage on the 16th.

GREAT WHITE EGRET

One was reported from the New Passage/ Pilning Wetland Reserve area on the 12th.

GREY PHALAROPE

One reported south past Severn Beach at 13:25 on the 25th; One was reported south past Oldbury Power Station at mid-day on the 26th.

MANDARIN

One was noted from Tortworth Court Lake on the 2nd.

MARSH HARRIFR

A juvenile was reported in flight to the east over Pilning Wetland Reserve, Northwick Warth in the afternoon on the 1st; One was reported from the New Passage/ Pilning Wetland Reserve area on the 12th; A juvenile was reported to the south-west over Pilning Wetland Reserve on the 14th; A female was noted on Northwick Warth on the 26th.

In January and February birds continued to show and were reported from all three lakes until at least February 19th. In March the last reported birds were noted with a female on the R. Avon east of the Lock Keeper at Keynsham on the 29th.

SEPTEMBER: One noted from the Northwick Warth/ Pilning Wetland Reserve area on the 2nd with the same or another present there on the 7th and the 16th.

HEN HARRIER Circus cyaneus - (c 55) 1

MAY: A female/ ringtail was reported from Hill Lane, Hill at ST: 649 940 on May 7th.

RED KITE Milvus milvus - (c.170) UK

HIGHEST COUNT: At least five probably six up-river past Severn Beach on March 22nd, four at Marshfield on March 16th and July 31st. EARLIEST: Two from the Oldbury Power Station environs during January. LATEST: One on Chipping Sodbury Common on December 5th.

AVOCET Recurvirostra avosetta – (c.290) c.25

Avocet bred for the first time in S. Glos in 2020 on Pilning WR, Northwick Warth. Read the full story in the articles section below! The first birds arrived on March 19th with five reported. That increased to eleven on the 22nd with fifteen present on the 25th. By June up to fifteen adults were in attendance with at least three well grown chicks bringing confirmation of the first ever successful breeding of this species for S. Gloucestershire! At least five adults and three juveniles were present on the reserve from July 1st - 15th.

Birds continued to be reported from the New Passage/ Pilning WR area in August and September and Shepperdine, Pillhead Gout and Littleton Warth also in September. Just one bird was logged in October on the Northwick Warth shore, three in the same area in November with a further five in December.

Thursday 27th

Male Blackcap in a village garden three calling Greenfinch from different places near the village church. Two Common Stonechat from Rushmead Lane and one from Middledown Lane. A pair of Treecreeper, five Grey Heron and c.280 Fieldfare in the Shire Valley.

Saturday 29th

Very wet and windy on Down Road this afternoon: Common Buzzard, Kestrel, 11 Stock Dove, Skylark, c.60 Linnet, Yellowhammer, Corn Bunting and two Rayen.

MARCH

Sunday 1st

Two Common Buzzard, three Kestrel, c.50 Lesser Black-backed Gull, Common Snipe by Broadmead Brook below Middledown Lane, several small groups of Stock Dove, c.12 Common Stonechat (two West Littleton Road, two Rushmead Lane, two Northfield Lane and six from Middledown Lane), plenty of singing Skylark, many Meadow Pipit, 20+ Yellowhammer, 45+ Corn Bunting including singing birds and a few lingering Redwing.

Thursday 5th

A Merlin over Down Road this afternoon. Also 25 Pied Wagtails and two Common Stonechat from Rushmead Lane. (John Barnett) Friday 6th Two Red Kite over Rushmead Farm. Around the patch, c.150 Lesser Black-backed Gull and a similar number of Common Gulls plus a few Herring Gulls, good numbers of Common Buzzard in the warmer weather, and finally... the return of the Little Owls!

Sunday 8th

A Marsh Tit was seen in the Shire Valley. C.100 Chaffinch and Yellowhammer from the Down Track area including lots of Continental Chaffinch. C.220 Linnet from Rushmead Farm. 30 Yellowhammer from Northfield Lane also Common Buzzard, two Kestrel, six Skylark, two Meadow Pipit, nine Pied Wagtail, 15 Fieldfare, 12 Corn Bunting, 30 Starling two Raven and a single Golden Plover in fields opposite Marshfield School.

Wednesday 11th

Three Canada Geese on West Littleton Dam.

Friday 13th

Rushmead and Northfield Lane: Three Common Buzzard, Kestrel, 12 Lesser Black- backed Gull, at least ten Skylark, three Pied Wagtail, 16 Common Stonechat with 12 together from Orchid Lane, c.80 Fieldfare, 20 Corn Bunting, 30 Yellowhammer, 60 Linnet, 70 Starling and Raven.

Tuesday 17th

Loads of Common Chiffchaff at Ringswell plus several Greenfinches around. News from the patch of up to three Short-eared Owls in an area with no public access. They have possibly wintered in the area which is best viewed looking south from Shirehill Lane.

Wednesday 18th

Two Short-eared Owl, Red Kite, three Common Buzzard, Kestrel, lots of Corn Buntings singing including one in the Shire Valley! Up to 100 Yellowhammer in various areas, 60 Linnet near Down Track, 35 Fieldfare on West Littleton Down and a further 50 in the Shire Valley, 33 Stock Dove, five Northern Wheatear on Rushmead Lane and Rushmead Farm, lots of Common Chiffchaff in Shire Valley and scattered elsewhere, good numbers of singing Skylark and two Raven.

Thursday 19th

At least four Northern Wheatear still present in fields from Rushmead Lane today. Saturday 21st Combined reports: Shire Valley - Grey Heron, male Blackcap, four (two pairs) Mistle Thrush, Kestrel and a few Fieldfare. Two Canada Geese still on West Littleton Dam but no sign of any Northern

Wheatear and it seems that all the Common Stonechat have gone. (John Barnett) At least eight Common Buzzard, three Red Kite, Sparrowhawk, two Kestrel, c.70 Lesser Black-backed and four Herring Gull, 18 Stock Dove, Barn Owl, Skylark, two Redwing, 19 Fieldfare, Yellowhammer, 40 Corn Bunting, 30 Linnet and five Rayen.

Sunday 22nd

Red Kite over Down Road also Kestrel and three Common Buzzard. 50-60 Golden Plover over Tormarton Road. (Pete Coslett) Several singing Common Chiffchaff and Blackcap south of the village. Four (two pairs) Mistle Thrush, Red

Kite and Goshawk from Ashwicke and Sparrowhawk from Ringswell. A mixed flock of c.100 Chaffinch and Yellowhammer also c.60 Linnet and c.50 Golden Plover between West Littleton and the Shire Valley and two Canada Geese still on West Littleton Pond.

Monday 23rd

A Red Kite, c.100 Linnet, c.100 Yellowhammer and Corn Bunting on Rushmead Farm. Northfield Lane, c.300 Herring and Lesser Black-backed Gulls.

Tuesday 24th

Five Canada Geese at West Littleton Dam also Grey Heron, c.150 Herring/ Lesser Black-backed Gull and a Red Kite over Ebbdown Farm.

Wednesday 25th

At least eight Common Buzzard, Red Kite, Sparrowhawk, 200+ Lesser Black-backed and Herring Gull, 10+ Sky Lark, 12 Meadow Pipit, five Pied Wagtail. two Common Chiffchaff, two Common Stonechat, Corn Bunting, two Short-eared Owl, three Grey Heron, several Blackcap, a couple of Fieldfare, c.60 Linnet, c.60 Yellowhammer, 40 Chaffinch, two Canada Geese and good numbers of Greenfinch in the village.

Thursday 26th

A Red Kite from Rushmead Lane also three Pied Wagtail. White Wagtail from Down Road plus 700+ Herring and Lesser Black-backed Gull. Two Canada Geese on West Littleton Dam and c.20 Fieldfare on West Littleton Down.

Friday 27th

Shire Valley; Little Egret, three Grey Heron, Mistle Thrush, Corn Bunting, several Common Chiffchaff and four Fieldfare. West Littleton Down; Peregrine and 30 Fieldfare. West Littleton Dam; two Canada Geese. Middledown Lane; c.40 Linnet. Northfield Lane; A few Pied Wagtail, Common Stonechat and Merlin.

Sunday 29th

A Bullfinch calling to the south-west of village, a couple of Redwing and around 30 Fieldfare in the Ashwicke area. C.90 Herring and Lesser Black-backed Gull from Northfield Lane and lots of Skylark singing north of the village.

Tuesday 31st

In the Shire Valley; Marsh Tit, three Mistle Thrush, five Grey Heron, singing Corn Bunting, Redwing and two Canada Geese new in on the second pond. Two Canada Geese on West Littleton Dam and 70 Herring/ Lesser Black-backed Gull from Middledown Lane. Generally lots of Skylark singing and increasing numbers of both Blackcap and Common Chiffchaff.

APRIL

Wednesday 1st

C.250 Fieldfare near Ashwicke and nearby in the trees 100+ flock of Fieldfare and Redwing, also singing Mistle Thrush. A pair of Canada Geese on Church Pond with two still on West Littleton Dam. Also two Kestrel on the patch.

Thursday 2nd

The first ever record of **Common Scoter** for the patch in an unprecedented nocturnal movement across the area. Several groups of birds were audible as they passed over Marshfield Village! Also today; c.70 Redwing, Swallow (the first

of the year), two Mistle Thrush and Kestrel at Ashwicke. C.80 Linnet plus loads of Skylark singing everywhere on Rushmead Farm. Common Stonechat and good numbers of Blackcap and Common Chiffchaff singing from Orchid Lane.

Friday 3rd

Two Lesser Redpoll at West Littleton with Goldfinch before they flew off, two Canada Geese still on the dam at West Littleton and small numbers of Fieldfare on West Littleton Down. Also several Meadow Pipit around.

Saturday 4th

A Whimbrel was heard calling (four times) at it flew over Middledown Lane late afternoon. Two Canada Geese on West Littleton Dam and two still on Church's Pond along with two Grey Wagtail. C.40 Linnet and c.40 Yellowhammer were noted on West Littleton Down and three Kestrel were logged.

Sunday 5th

Two Northern Wheatear on Rushmead Lane, two Canada Geese on Small Pond in the Shire Valley along with four Mistle Thrush and two Grey Heron. Two Mistle Thrush plus a few Redwing and Fieldfare at Ashwicke, c.70 Fieldfare at

Ringswell, several Great Spotted and Green Woodpecker calling and drumming south of the village early morning as well as two Swallow.

Monday 6th

Two Canada Geese still present on West Littleton Dam, 45 Fieldfare on West Littleton Down, Common Stonechat from Orchid Lane and Swallow over the village.

Tuesday 7th

Two Little Owl at West Littleton and two Canada Geese on West Littleton Dam still. Two more Canada Geese on Small Pond in the Shire Valley, two Mistle Thrush and a Goshawk heard calling from Gunning's Wood. A White Wagtail was seen in horse paddocks from Rushmead Lane, Swallow from Northfield Lane along with several Meadow Pipit. A Tawny Owl mobbed by small birds at Ringswell; Swallow and three Willow Warbler around Ringswell Dew Pond.

Wednesday 8th

Hobby over the east end of the village this evening also two Swallow at Ringswell Dew Pond and seventeen Fieldfare south of village. Common Stonechat at Orchid Lane.

Thursday 9th

Two Canada Geese and Grey Heron on West Littleton Dam and two Swallow at Ringswell Dew Pond.

Friday 10th

Grey Heron; two in the Shire Valley and one at West Littleton Dam. Canada Goose; two in the Shire Valley on the Small Pond and two at West Littleton Dam. Red Kite; one over Rushmead Lane. Sand Martin; one over the village was new for the year. Swallow; four at West Littleton and two at Ringswell Dew Pond. Common Stonechat; one from Orchid Lane. Song Thrush; several singing in the valleys north of the village. Mistle Thrush; three in the Shire Valley and one in the village. Blackcap and Common Chiffchaff; 'lots' singing everywhere. Willow Warbler; two singing in the Shire Valley. Bullfinch; one on West Littleton Down, Linnet; they really are everywhere you look! Corn Bunting; a lot singing especially from the Down Road area.

Saturday 11th

Two Northern and one Greenland Wheatear from Middledown Lane, two Canada Geese on Church Pond and a Goshawk over Beek's Lane.

Monday 13th

Highlight; at least seven ducklings for the Mallard pair on Ringswell Dew Pond! Two Swallow over Ringswell Dew Pond, two Canada Geese on Church Pond and a further two in the Shire Valley plus two Mistle Thrush singing and two Grey Heron. Corn Bunting/ Yellowhammer a flock of 100+ on Rushmead Farm.

Tuesday 14th

A White Wagtail at West Littleton Dam plus Canada Goose and Swallow. Nine ducklings, Grey Wagtail and two Swallow at Ringswell Dew Pond.

Wednesday 15th

A pair of Marsh Tit in Cherry Wood; Swallow, two over Ringswell Dew Pond and two at Ashwicke; Blackcap appears widespread; Common Chiffchaff, even more than a couple of days ago; Willow Warbler, three at Ringswell and one from Ayford Lane; Mistle Thrush, two at Ashwicke; Bullfinch, singles at Ringswell and Ashwicke plus two at Cherry Wood.

Thursday 16th

A Common Whitethroat from Rushmead Lane plus three Northern Wheatear. Four more Northern Wheatear from Orchid land and another Common Whitethroat from Dunsdown Lane. A Red Kite over West Littleton, two Canada Geese, two Swallow and Grey Heron on West Littleton Dam.

Friday 17th

Singing Willow Warbler south of the village, nine Mallard ducklings doing well on Ringswell Dew Pond also two Swallow there, Northern Wheatear from Rushmead Lane in horse paddocks, good numbers of Corn Bunting from on Northfield Lane, c.60 on Rushmead Farm, two Mistle Thrush and Common Whitethroat on Ringswell Common.

Saturday 18th

A Yellow Wagtail in horse paddocks from Rushmead Lane also five Northern Wheatear and several Pied Wagtail. From West Littleton Dam, two Canada Geese, four Swallow and Fieldfare. On Church's Pond, two more Canada Geese, Common Whitethroat from Down Road and Shirehill Lane.

Sunday 19th

A few Swallow around including from Rushmead Lane where there were also two Sand Martin and four Northern Wheatear in the horse paddock. A Lesser Whitethroat near Beek's Lane, eight ducklings at Ringswell Dew Pond, Bullfinch from Cherry Wood, Common Whitethroat at West End Lane and Ayford Lane plus large numbers of Blackcap in the whole area.

Monday 20th

Fourteen House Martin, a few Swallow and calling Tawny Owl at Ringswell. Two Canada Geese over the village at dawn, five Northern Wheatear from Orchid/Rushmead Lane and a couple of Common Whitethroat noted.

Tuesday 21st

Highlight; Sparrowhawk taking a Pigeon and then fighting off Common Buzzard and Crow! In the Shire Valley, four Grey Heron and two Canada Geese with a further two Canada Geese on West Littleton Dam. Other Interesting Stuff from S. Gloucestershire in 2020!

There are several 'super' patches watched on a daily basis in S. Gloucestershire; Marshfield, Oldbury Power Station, Severnside and Yate and Chipping Sodbury. So, in a new feature, below is a 'round-up' of what was seen throughout the year on those patches.

Oldbury Power Station

A total of 149 species recorded at the site from all-comers was the worst year since 2014 with my personal total for the site at 142 species (my worst total since 2014). The result of 293 visits (sixteen more than the previous most in 2019).

Average number of species per visit was 42, which is the lowest since I started recording this in 2004. Highest was 51 in 2006, and it was 43 last year. The fall in this number is partly due to an increase in number of visits (from 109 in 2006), as it is difficult to record every species every visit, although I do try. Highest number of species in a day was 68 on November 3rd (second time highest in year has been in November - also in 2014). (68 is my 4th equal highest day-total) In contrast to the low species total, it was one of the best years in the last fifteen for rare or very rare birds.

I added Tundra Bean Goose to my OPS list (bringing it to 198 species for me at OPS). This and Wryneck were added to the OPS list, and Common Redpoll was retrospectively added from 2009. The Total number of bird species recorded at OPS is now 230.

The commonest (for OPS) birds not seen this year were Jack Snipe and Great Skua (both seen 9 out of 10 previous years). The other relatively common birds not seen at the site were: Brent Goose (which is remarkable considering the other Goose species recorded this year - see below), Little Ringed Plover, Nuthatch, Pochard, Ruff and Water Pipit. Little Owl now not seen for eight years and no Little Stint for four years.

The year started ok, with 86 species by end of January (3rd best January), including 59 on the 1st day. But by end of March only 101 species had been

seen by all-comers (and 97 by me), about five behind recent years, due to mild weather. Then a combination of Covid lockdown and a month of good weather (allowing birds to pass over and not drop down) killed April and May, by the end of which 124 species (119 for me) had been seen, about twelve behind an average year. Numbers recovered a bit with a good July and August, but autumn was very quiet, again due to a prolonged spell of settled weather allowing birds to fly on instead of drop in. So, the total ended up about five species behind an average year.

The highlights through the year were:

JANUARY

An Egyptian Goose over the lake, two Black Redstarts (adult male and female-type), Short-eared Owl, two Great Crested Grebe, a distant Goshawk, an adult female Marsh Harrier, 1+ Red Kite, c.7,000 Starlings roosting and Harbour Porpoise (unfortunately dead).

FFBRUARY

A Corn Bunting (probably same as last year in January/ February), Short-eared Owl, male Marsh Harrier, 9+ Kittiwake upriver, female-type Black Redstart still and four canoes from the Wye Valley washed up in floods!

MARCH

The Corn Bunting, Short-eared Owl and female-type Black Redstart still; two distant Goshawk (first multiple sighting), two Coal Tit, Little Gull upriver, an early Swallow and Canada Goose on a nest and Hoopoe reported.

APRIL

Seven Sandwich Tern, three Little Gull and three Arctic Skua upriver; a close encountered Goshawk; earliest ever Reed Warbler (7th), Yellow Wagtail (11th), Cuckoo (13th), Whinchat (17th) and Hobby (15th); two Barnacle Goose, a pair of Garganey, a late Black Redstart, a third Marsh Harrier (female), seven Canada Goose goslings only lasted one day and a crazy Mallard nest!

MAY

Two Greenshank, another Great Crested Grebe, Hare, Red Kite, female Marsh Harrier again, ten Sanderling and Barn Owl reported.

JUNE

Two Great White Egret upriver (first multiple record), three+ Common Crossbill over, Kittiwake downriver, Red Kite, two families of Cetti's Warbler, Purple Hairstreak butterfly, an Eyed Hawkmoth and Scarlet Tiger Moth.

JULY

Five Common Scoter downriver, juvenile Northern Wheatear and Common Stonechat, Red-legged Partridge heard, OPS record fifteen Mistle Thrush, and a mad twenty-two Red-breasted Merganser.

AUGUST

A male Nightjar in the Orchard, four Garganey reported, three+ Green Sandpiper, Curlew Sandpiper, a dead Gannet, Grey Phalarope, two + Silverwashed Fritillary and Brown Argus butterflies, plus Small Red-eyed Damselfly.

SEPTEMBER

Another Great White Egret, three Curlew Sandpipers, flocks of six and four Avocet, yet another two Great Crested Grebe, Wryneck and an unusual record of Kingfisher on the shore.

OCTOBER

A S. Glos record count of twenty Common Stonechat, Manx Shearwater killed by a gull, Bar-headed Goose, Bramblings, Common and Grey Seals.

NOVEMBER

A 1st-winter Little Gull upriver, a record c.1,600 Woodpigeon migrating, a late Northern Wheatear (to 4th), male Yellowhammer and three+ (probably four) Black Redstart.

DECEMBER

Eleven Tundra Bean Goose were seen intermittently for a week, four Whooper Swan on the estuary, one+ Common Redpoll, Red-legged Partridge, two Yellowhammer and Black Redstart still.

Yate & Chipping Sodbury 2020

JANUARY

Fifty species of bird were seen on the 1st including Jack Snipe, Kingfisher and Lapwing. On the 9th my first patch tick of the year, a Male Goosander arrived on Stanshaw's Lake increasing to eight birds by February. The 2nd Patch tick came on the 29th when an Oystercatcher flew over Chipping Sodbury Common.

FEBRUARY

On the 6th a female Yellowhammer was on Chipping Sodbury Common (CSC) in the morning along with two Jack Snipe; On the 19th eight Goosander on Stanshaw's Lake, Little Owls were back at their nest site on CSC, the nesting pair of Peregrines was first seen on the 22nd flying over CSC and a Barn Owl there on 27th brought the year total up to 73

MARCH

The first Little Egret for the year was seen on the 9th along with the returning pair of Little Grebes on the old quarry pool in Chipping Sodbury and the first three Chiffchaffs of the year were on CSC, the first Northern Wheatear arrived on CSC on the 14th, a Red Kite over Yate on the 20th, Sand Martin over Kingsgate Park on the 23rd and Willow Warbler also there on the 27th.

APRIL

With the large movements of Common Scoter being reported nationwide during the nights I tried on the 2nd and had three flocks calling, all going East or North-east between 21:15 -22:00 my 3rd patch tick. An Osprey over my garden on the 4th and the first Swallow over the same day; On the 5th a male Common Redstart was on CSC, Common Whitethroat on there on the 9th, Sedge Warbler in Kingsgate Park on the 11th, Tree Pipit and Whinchat on CSC on the 16th and Hobby over my garden the same day. The 19th saw an influx of migrants including a singing male Wood, Garden, Sedge and Reed Warblers on Yate Common and a male Common Whitethroat in my garden! The 2nd Wood warbler for the year was also on Yate Common on the 21st but it moved straight through.

MAY

On the 1st the only Common Sandpiper of the year was on a tiny Dragonfly pond on Yate Common. Two Hobby over the garden along with two Peregrine Falcons, five Red Kite and seven Common Swifts in the morning of the 4th, a Little Egret on the River Frome in Yate on the 7th, another two Hobby over my garden on the 8th. Red Kite was seen throughout the month with fifteen sightings in total for May.

JUNE

A very quiet month with most time spent looking for Dragonflies and Butterflies but a male Common Crossbill calling over Kingsgate Park on the 26th brought the patch year total up to 99.

JULY

Probably the same male Common Crossbill was again calling over Kingsgate Park on the 3rd, the first Common Redstarts returned on the 5th with an adult and two juveniles on CSC increasing to six birds by the 13th along with the first four returning Whinchats. On the 20th I had another patch tick when a flock of Dunlin were heard calling several times over CSC at around 01:30 while I was photographing the Neowise Comet. My 100th species of bird for the year.

AUGUST

Two Spotted Flycatchers on CSC on the 8th and a Green Sandpiper on the small pond there on the 9th brought the year total to 102. Migrants started arriving in larger numbers on CSC with ten+ Common Redstarts and six Whinchats on the 19th and six Spotted Flycatchers on the 23rd, another patch tick on the 24th when a Ringed Plover flew from Chipping Sodbury Golf Course and over CSC, a Grasshopper Warbler at CSC on the 27th made 104 for the year. A large flock of well over 500 Swallows, 50 House Martins and several Sand Martins covered the wires and trees by the farms on CSC on the morning of the 31st, most had moved on by 09:00.

SEPTEMBER

My last patch tick of the year was a juvenile Corn Bunting at CSC on the 1st, the same day the year's first Mandarin arrived at Kingsgate Park staying until the 6th bringing the year total to 106.

OCTOBER

Most summer migrants had left by now, the last Northern Wheatear was on the 1st and Whinchat on the 2nd, a Brambling flew over CSC with a small flock of Chaffinch on the 20th was the only new bird for the year and last Swallow of the year was on the 23rd also on CSC.

NOVEMBER

A female Common Teal was at Kingsgate Park on the 1st staying into December, the years only Hawfinch flew over my garden on the 10th, a female Blackcap arrived in my garden on the 12th staying into 2021, four Goosander returned to the patch on the 24th increasing to eight birds by the end of the year, a Jack Snipe and Woodcock on Yate Common made 109 for the year.

DECEMBER

The last sighting of Red Kite was seen on CSC on the 5th, a female Pochard in Kingsgate Park on the 7th was the first patch record for around eight years! The last patch year tick was a Ring-necked Parakeet that flew over my garden and Kingsgate Park on the 24th.

Total patch year list for 2020 was 111 beating the previous best of 106 in 2018.

Severnside Breeding Waders 2020

Following on from successful breeding of Lapwing and Little Ringed Plovers in the last three years and the first nesting attempt of Avocets in May 2018, I was optimistic for a good breeding year in 2020.

Between March 19th and 23rd Avocets were present on Northwick Warth Flash and the adjacent Pilning Wetland Reserve including eleven on March 22nd. This spring passage has almost become expected in recent years with good numbers breeding nearby at Newport Wetlands NNR, Goldcliff Pools in Gwent and Slimbridge WWT further up the estuary in Gloucestershire. I had assumed that our birds were overshoots from Gwent or birds trying to relocate to Slimbridge.

March 23rd 2020 was a memorable day in UK history when the first National lockdown as a response to the Covid-19 pandemic was announced. This meant that only one period of 'local exercise' was permitted resulting in far fewer people visiting the area and for me abandoning the use of my car for birding and more walking and cycling from home in Severn Beach to Pilning Wetland Reserve.

On April 7th I found another two Avocets on the rear wader pool of Pilning Wetland Reserve and again assumed they were birds on their way to

somewhere better. On my daily visits I saw them again in the following days and on April 10th saw them mating and what appeared to be a nest on one shallow island. I thought it prudent over the next few days to inform two of the resident birdwatchers who live at New Passage and suggested that news be kept off of social media.

The pair remained faithful to their nest and over the next two months were joined by up to fifteen other birds including a French colour-ringed individual on several dates in June. The water levels on the wader scrape dropped over time creating additional islands and three other pairs appeared to be incubating on nests, one of which shared an island with a pair of nesting Canada Geese.

On a visit on June 5th I was pleased to see at least two freshly hatched Avocet chicks from the first pair and confirmed as three chicks two days later. On June 11th, four chicks were seen and on June 14th June, two new chicks plus the original three larger chicks were seen.

Predator species seen to be attacking the chicks included Common Buzzard, Raven, Carrion Crow and Lesser Black-backed Gulls and so it was a great relief that the original three near full sized juveniles were seen to fly for the first time on July 7th.

It would appear that the other chicks were predated or died and some of the eggs were lost to predators involving the bird species mentioned or Foxes that would have easy access to the nests.

Additional wader breeding:

Little Ringed Plovers were present on site from March and three nests were located including one pair that nested on a stony track (I notified the landowner and traffic a cone and a short detour were put in place for a month).

During the incubation period it was nail biting to watch the local Magpies, Jackdaws and Crows getting close to the nests and only the distraction behaviour of the adults keeping the eggs safe. One brood of four chicks appeared on May 30th, all of which were seen to grow to full size and fly.

Another three chicks hatched from another nest and were seen for three days before they disappeared into the grassy vegetation. The third nest, on the track, hatched at least two chicks but they moved into cover almost immediately and were not seen again.

A surprise find; a fourth broad of two freshly hatched chicks were found on July 18th and a third chick appeared the following day.

A pair of Oystercatchers were observed incubating for four weeks but suddenly disappeared, presumed predated.

On June 13th, while checking the progress of the nesting Oystercatchers and Little Ringed Plover nest two, I was surprised to observe a pair of displaying and mating Ringed Plover.

After a while I watched one of the birds settle on what appeared to be a nest scrape. Over the next two days I saw the Ringed Plovers incubating but they left the area the same day as the Oystercatchers and were presumed to also have been predated as the nests were only three metres apart.

It was difficult to determine the exact number of Lapwing pairs and success; but between eight and ten pairs were present from early spring. Three nests were located but with the constant predation by Corvids followed by repeat laying the first three Lapwing chicks were eventually seen on June 9th.

At least four other broods of two/ three young were seen, some being predated and others managing to seek cover of vegetation and reaching full size.

All in all a good year with three out of five breeding species being successful and confirmation of the first time that Avocet have bred successfully in S. Gloucestershire!
